

**NOTICE PURSUANT TO SECTION 177AE OF THE PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT ACT 2000,
AS AMENDED, RELATING TO A PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT BY CARLOW COUNTY COUNCIL**

TAKE NOTICE that Carlow County Council proposes to seek approval from An Bord Pleanála to carry out the following development – Construction of a Pedestrian Cycle Route and Bridge Crossing of the River Derry linking Clonegal and Kildavin to join the South Leinster Way and The Wicklow Way.

A Natura Impact Statement (NIS) has been prepared in respect of the proposed development.

An Bord Pleanála may approve the proposed development in whole or in part, with or without specified modifications or it may refuse to approve the proposed development.
